By the time you read this, the calendar will say it's February and the groundhog will have decided whether we have six more weeks of winter. (I'm guessing that groundhog's not a Yooper if it thinks winter will be over by the middle of March.)

As Christians, we have yet another way of keeping time. According to the liturgical calendar of the Church, we are living in *ordinary* time. This *ordinary* time starts after Epiphany ends the Christmas season, and it carries us through until Transfiguration Sunday, a few days before Ash Wednesday leads us into our Lenten journey toward Easter. So, for now, we are living in *ordinary* time.

For now, I'm inviting us to use our *ordinary* time to prepare for that *new normal* we know is on the way. Each of us in our own lives and in our congregational life together face change. Some change we have long expected and welcome, like the birth of a child or a promotion or graduation. Other changes come suddenly, catch us unprepared, and may be most unwelcome, like a slip on the ice, a difficult medical diagnosis, or the death of a loved one. For a time, nothing may seem ordinary. Yet always, on the other side of change, we eventually find our *new normal* that includes whatever changes we have been through and moves us forward to face whatever is coming next.

The value of *ordinary* time is that it gives us time to pay attention to what we consider to be ordinary in our lives. In our spiritual lives, this can be a time to identify and appreciate the everyday ways in which we experience God's presence: in the routine of Sunday worship or daily prayer and Bible reading; in the simple acts of offering mealtime prayers or blessing our family; in the regular gifts we give through our offering or food pantry contributions; in the service we do helping a neighbor, sending a card, making meals, singing in choir; in the ways we continue to learn, studying together, supporting each other. When we practice these *ordinary*, everyday habits and routines, we invite that regular awareness of God with us, and we strengthen our connections to each other.

Then, when change does come, the extraordinary happens. We find we have all that we need to move through whatever comes, with God and each other, toward our new normal—from ordinary life, through death, to resurrection.
