The United Methodist Church "is founded on a Wesleyan theology of grace, anchored in Scripture, and based in the life and teachings of Jesus Christ and the movement of the Holy Spirit" (#BeUMC on umc.org).

For the past 25 years over the week of July 4th, I have been a counselor for a choir camp. When I started as a counselor, the camp was held at the Judson Collins Camp by Adrian, MI.. I was quite happy when they chose to hold choir camp at Lake Louise which is about 10 miles north of Gaylord.

I have seen many changes come and go but the one thing that is always present at camp is the love of God. As staff we are very intentional about sharing the love of God with all the campers.

At camp my day starts at 6:30. I get up, put my coffee on (I take a coffee pot with me so I can have it in my cabin), get dressed, grab my coffee and cd player, and head to the Fire Bowl where some of the campers and I gather to watch the sun come up over the lake and listen to some meditative music.

This is followed by breakfast, Morning Praise, choir practice, and contract classes. You may be wondering what a contract class is. Each Counselor conducts one class per day. They share one of their passions with the campers. It can be singing Broadway tunes, learning to knit, coloring mandalas by the beach, doing arts and crafts, tie dying t-shirts, or playing in the band. I introduce the campers to my homeland—the U.P. They learn facts about the U.P. (Did you know there are 1,700 miles of coastland in the U.P.?) I also treat them with some of the finest food the U.P. has to offer – pasties, saffron bread, cardamom bread, corn fritters, Sayklly's Yooper bars, and real maple syrup.

Morning contract class is followed by lunch and then one of my favorite times of the day—"H Hour" or better known as rest hour. After rest hour we have cabin devotions, afternoon choir practice, contract classes, supervised activity time —the campers can pick what they want to do, such as swimming, playing games, reading, singing, etc.... This is followed by supper, free expression which is a time when you can share a talent you have with the camp and then a planned evening activity which could be a scavenger hunt, singing to the cottagers around the lake, or helping the staff with a special project. Our evening concludes with evening vespers.

Each week has an overall theme which is broken down into segments for the days of the week. This year the week's theme was "Living Intentionally." We looked at Jesus' life from birth, to baptism, to choices. They remembered their baptism by having a water balloon fight.

On Saturday, the last day of camp, the campers put on a concert for their family and friends. The youth choir and the elementary choir perform as does the praise band.

When I arrive home on Saturday afternoon from spending a week at choir camp, I am physically exhausted, but I am on a spiritual high. It is always a week of being in the presence of God and I am totally blessed

Dennis Harrison had been chair of Trustees at the time. Gary Shiplett was the pastor then, and he also remembered the letter, as did Tom Butch. The 1997 letter was found, and Dennis Harrison persistently contacted the city over these last number of weeks until they agreed to honor the letter and not assess us.

A Bit of Local History

Occasionally someone comes in doing genealogy research or wanting to know other information that requires me to go deep into the historical files of our church. On once of these searches, I discovered the membership books and records of the Masonville Methodist Episcopal Church, which apparently folded in 1908 and whose records we inherited and are now safe-keeping. This triggered my curiosity to surf the internet in search of anything I might find about the Masonville Methodist Episcopal Church, including if perchance the old structure might still be standing or at least there might still be a graveyard next to where the church once stood. I did not find anything, but in typing in the words 1908 and Methodist Episcopal Church, the following cool article cropped up.

The 1908 Social Creed of the Methodist Episcopal Church

The Methodist Episcopal Church, a predecessor of The United Methodist Church, adopted a Social Creed that called for an end to child labor, a fair wage and safety standards.

The Methodist Episcopal Church stands -

For equal rights and complete justice for all (people) in all stations of life.

For the principle of conciliation and arbitration in industrial dissensions.

For the protection of the worker from dangerous machinery, occupational diseases, injuries and mortality.

For the abolition of child labor.

For such regulation of the conditions of labor for women as shall safe guard the physical and moral health of the community.

For the suppression of the "sweating system."

For the gradual and reasonable reduction of hours of labor to the lowest practical point, with work for all; and for that degree of leisure for all which is the condition of the highest human life. For a release from employment one day in seven.

For a living wage in every industry.

For the highest wage that each industry can afford, and for the most equitable division of the products of industry that can ultimately be devised.

For the recognition of the Golden Rule and the mind of Christ as the supreme law of society and the sure remedy for all social ills.

Life Line Screening will offer non-invasive and painless health screenings at Memorial on Monday, August 14, 2023.

Carotid Artery Screening (Plaque)

An ultrasound is performed to screen the carotid arteries (a pair of blood vessels in the neck that deliver blood to your brain) for buildup of fatty plaque. This buildup, called atherosclerosis, is one of the leading causes of stroke.

Peripheral Arterial Disease Screening

An Ankle-Brachial Index (ABI) test is performed using blood pressure cuffs on the arms and legs. It is important to screen for PAD because it increases the risk of coronary artery disease, heart attack, or stroke.¹

Abdominal Aortic Aneurysm (AAA)

An ultrasound is performed to screen the abdominal aorta for the presence of an enlargement or aneurysm. AAA can lead to a ruptured aortic artery, which is a serious medical emergency.

Atrial Fibrillation

A 6-lead electrocardiogram (EKG) is performed by placing sensors on the arms and legs to screen for Atrial Fibrillation. AFib can lead to blood clots, stroke, and heart failure, and other heart-related complications.²
